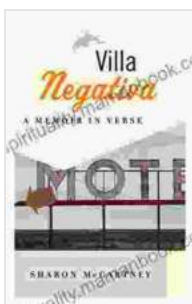


Villa Negativa: A Memoir in Verse Explores the Darkness and Trauma of Child Abuse

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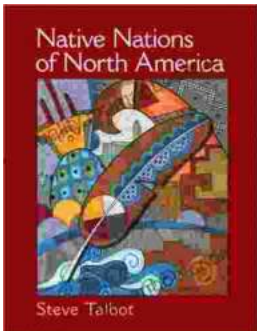
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
